AS Unit 1 - Government in Wales and the United Kingdom - 1 hour and 30 minutes written examination that makes up 20% of qualification.

AS Unit 2 - Living and Participating in a Democracy - 1 hour and 30 minutes written examination that makes up 20% of qualification.

A2 Unit 3 - Political Concepts and Theories - 2 hours written examination that makes up 30% of qualification.

A2 Unit 4 - Government and Politics of the USA - 2 hours written examination that makes up 30% of qualification.

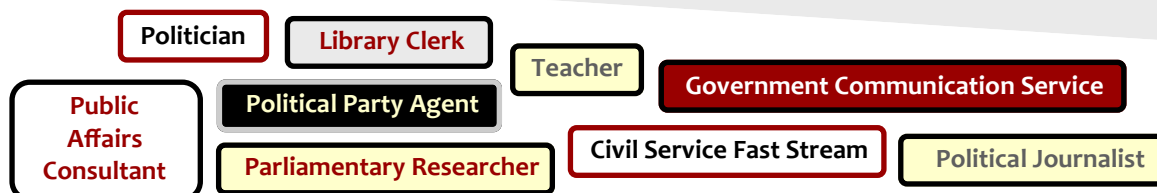
Entry Requirements
