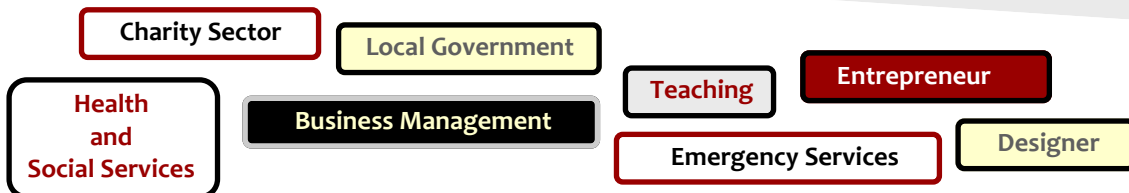
Entry Requirements
