AS Unit 1 - Psychology: Past to Present - 1 hour and 30 minutes written examination that makes up 20% of qualification.

AS Unit 2 - Psychology: Using Psychological Concepts - 1 hour and 30 minutes written examination that makes up 20% of qualification.

A2 Unit 3 - Psychology: Implications in the Real World - 2 hours and 30 minutes written examination that makes up 40% of qualification.

A2 Unit 4 - Psychology: Applied Research Methods - 1 hour and 30 minutes written examination that makes up 20% of qualification.

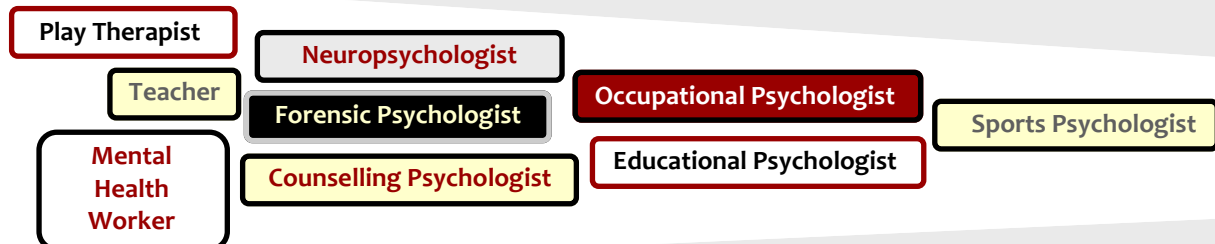
Entry Requirements
